



#### **Quick Facts on Transportation Infrastructure**

- Some statistics, from the 2022 USDOT Transportation Statistics Annual Report:
  - Connects 7.9M businesses with customers, suppliers, and workers.
  - Served 327M residents and 80M visitors.
  - 273.6 million motor vehicles drove a total of more than 3.2 trillion miles.
  - Transportation assets valued at about \$8.3 trillion
    - Public highways & streets accounted for ~ 45% or \$3.7 trillion
  - Other publicly owned transportation, such as airports, seaports, and transit structures, accounted for \$861 billion.







#### Quick Facts (Con't)

- National Highway System includes more than 617K bridges.
- > Average age of 44 years,
- > 42% are at least 50 years old, 7.5% considered structurally deficient.
- > Estimated \$22.7 billion needed annually to improve their condition.











#### **Importance of Preservation**

- Preserving our investment, and ensuring a resilient transportation infrastructure is intrinsically fundamental.
- Preservation is also critical to public agencies' essential mission to provide a safe, efficient, sustainable, and durable transportation infrastructure while minimizing impact to the traveling public and promoting healthy communities.
